
Happy International Women's Day

Become a firefighter



Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV) firefighters serve and protect communities across Melbourne and Victoria's major regional centres. This is a challenging and rewarding role with a lot of variety and great opportunities for career progression.

About the role

Every shift is different, and you will be doing far more than just fighting fires.

Career firefighters:

- respond to fires, complex rescues, road crashes, emergency medical calls and hazardous chemical spills
- talk to schools, communities and local business groups about fire safety and prevention
- maintain and monitor equipment and water supplies
- take part in regular training to maintain and develop their skills
- advocate for changes that improve community and firefighter safety.

"Firefighters perform a diverse range of roles, with great opportunities for specialisation and career progression."



Who can apply?

FRV is looking for women and men from all walks of life and backgrounds. Applicants must be an Australian citizen or permanent resident and comply with FRV's criminal history and driver history policies.

Physical fitness and the ability to perform under pressure are essential qualities, as is the ability to work closely in a team, and with the diverse communities we serve.

People who speak languages in addition to English are encouraged to consider firefighting as a career.

Be aware that the role involves shift work and can be physically and emotionally demanding.

Recruitment process

This is a competitive process that can last six to 12 months. It is important to consider the level of commitment involved. Once you submit your online application you will be invited to attend several phases of testing.

These include:

- written selection test (WST)
- group assessment and medical clearance
- shuttle run
- personality profile
- selection interview
- physical aptitude test (PAT)
- pre-employment medical
- assessment

Upon successful completion of the selection interview, the order of merit will be created according to the candidate's written selection test, group assessment and selection interview scores. Only the top scoring candidates are considered on the final shortlist.

Tips for students

You can prepare for a firefighting career while you are studying.

Preparing to be a firefighter

- Take every opportunity to develop your team work, customer service and public speaking skills. This might be through work experience, a parttime job or extra school, university, community or sports activities.
- Get to know your community by volunteering with a local organisation and increase your exposure to the many diverse groups it is made up of.
- Stay fit. You will need to take a holistic approach to fitness that includes upper and lower body strength, as well as cardio.
- Get your driver's licence as early as you can. Maintain a good driving history because this is taken into consideration.

- Practise your English and maths skills - these will be tested as part of the written selection test.
- Study a subject that develops practical or mechanical skills. While there are no specific prerequisite subjects, you will be tested on your mechanical reasoning during the recruitment process.
- Take the time to visit FRV's website including the news section – and learn as much as you can about the different aspects of the role.
- Stay positive and don't give up. The application process is competitive, and it may take more than one attempt to get through. Preparation is key.

About FRV

FRV was established on 1st July 2020 bringing together Victoria's career firefighters.

FRV works as one in the emergency services sector. We serve and protect our community and provide a contemporary fire and rescue service Our firefighters are highly trained and ready to respond to a wide range of emergency incidents 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, including bush and structure fires, road crashes, emergency medical response, chemical spills, complex rescues, floods and other natural disasters.

We operate 85 fire and rescue stations across the state. FRV's stations are located from Mildura to Traralgon and from Portland to Wodonga.
