
























Year 10 Semi Formal

On Friday, November 26th, Year 10 students enjoyed their Semi Formal which was held at the Elliminyt Hall.







Hands on Learning at CSC - 2022 Intake - Year 8 and 9 students

CSC's Hands on Learning is seeking Expressions of Interest from students in Year 8 and 9 in 2022.

Hands on Learning is a project-based learning program that exists to offer an alternative to classroom-based learning and support student skill development through real-world experiences. At CSC, HoL runs for one full day per week with a small group of students. HoL has a focus on project planning, hands-on skills and community engagement, as well as social and emotional development, wellbeing, teamwork and positive engagement with school.

Students who are interested in building, furniture making, painting, artwork, landscaping and gardening, agriculture, wood or metalwork, animals or machinery may find their passion in Hands on Learning. Students who struggle in a classroom environment and enjoy being outside may find that HoL suits their learning needs. The program is assessed and reported on, and it supports students to develop a strong work ethic, communication and listening skills, a positive approach to peers and workmates, and the courage to have a go at new skills and take up challenges.

The HoL program is open to all students. Any student or parent who is interested in the program is invited and encouraged to contact Mr. Rieniets or Miles.

The 2022 HoL group will consist of up to 10 students of all genders, who will work with Mr. Rieniets, Miles and a member of CSC's Education Support staff. Expressions of Interest must be completed by students and parents/carers, and signed by a parent/carer. EOIs will be accepted until the end of Week 1 of Term 1. Student interviews and intake will take place at the start of Term 1; successful applicants will be notified in Week 2 and the 2022 HoL program will begin in Week 3 of Term 1 in 2022.

Careers Corner

VET Pathways

As part of your senior schooling, you are now able to study courses that not only contribute towards your VCE, VCAL and ATAR (with certain restrictions), but also give you an industry recognised qualification when you complete that course.

The courses are called Vocational Courses and can be studied at school or through another Registered Training Organisation such as TAFE. This means that if you choose to go to TAFE when you leave school, and continue your study in that same area, you will be deemed to have completed part of that TAFE course already (you did it while still at school!).

This is what you get from VET Nationally recognised qualification

VET is a national system with qualifications that are recognised and can lead to employment anywhere in Australia.

Technical skills

Develop technical skills through specialised training for a specific job or industry.

Employability skills

Develop non-technical skills that can be applied across different jobs and industries. Skills include: communication, teamwork, problem solving, initiative and enterprise, planning and organising, self-management, learning and technology.

Knowledge

Gain knowledge through specialised training to understand and perform specific workplace tasks.

Industry knowledge

Learn how an industry works – see the big picture and learn how to progress your career.

Employment opportunities

VET can lead to full-time, part-time or casual employment opportunities. This flexibility may allow you to follow multiple interests at the same time – like employment, education and volunteering.

Financial outcomes

Apprenticeships and traineeships allow you to earn an income as you train, study and work.

Once you receive a VET qualification you may be able to gain employment that can finance further studies – like a more advanced qualification.

Secure income

A VET qualification in an area with increasing job opportunities may provide you with a secure income.

Education pathways

VET can lead to TAFE or university

This is how VET is different

Here are the top five differences between a VCE VET program and a VCE study or a VCAL unit:

- 1. An extra qualification You can gain a nationally recognised VET qualification while undertaking your VCE or VCAL. You receive the VET qualification from a Registered Training Organisation, such as a TAFE.
- 2. Connected to the workplace VET qualifications give you industry exposure and experience in the workplace that reinforces your skills development. This connection also makes for a smooth transition between training and work.
- 3. Practical VET can strengthen your education by giving you the opportunity to gain practical skills and knowledge that complement your VCE studies. For example, if you want to be an engineer and you are studying VCE Physics and VCE Mathematical Methods, you can develop practical skills, technical knowledge and industry insight by doing VCE VET Engineering.
- 4. Units of competency Units of competency are the building blocks that make up a VET qualification. Each unit of competency includes specific skills and knowledge.
- 5. Competency based assessment VET students are assessed as 'competent' or 'not yet competent' in each unit of competency. To be assessed as competent, you must show a consistent application of skills and knowledge to the standard required in the workplace. To make sure you are ready to begin your career or continue with further study, assessments take place in a real or simulated workplace environment

Debunking Myths around VET Pathways:

- University is the only pathway to a sustainable career
- Apprenticeships and traineeships don't offer the same financial opportunities as other pathways
- VET is too hard physically

As parents, how many times have you thought or heard these statements?

School-based Apprenticeships and Traineeships

A school-based apprenticeship or traineeship (SBAT) is an apprenticeship or traineeship undertaken by a student enrolled in a senior secondary program (VCE or VCAL). The student commences their Apprenticeship/Traineeship but in a Part-time capacity.

Regular school attendance is combined with at least one timetabled day per week spent on the job and one day per week in training during the normal school week.

An SBAT combines part-time, practical experience in the workplace with recognised, structured training from a Registered Training Organisation.

Student's wishing to undertake a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship have to secure an employer, willing to participate in the program. The school can certainly assist with this.

A lot of School based Apprenticeship and Traineeship opportunities evolve from Year 10 Work Experience placement.
